


The Schwa










What on earth is a schwa?

The easiest way to learn about the schwa is to say the following words out loud:



Without realising it, you have just used the schwa sound six times for the vowels *a*, *e*, *i*, *o*, *u* and *y*. Say them again to hear how the schwa comes on the unstressed or soft part of each word. This book will now take you gently through its pages to show you how the schwa is your constant companion whenever you speak, read, think, chat to your friends, buy a bus ticket or ask Mum what's for dinner ... There it will be.

The pronunciation symbol for the schwa is easy to remember because it's an upside-down e: •.

I'm afraid I need to leave the giant alone for a while so that I can talk to the media about his amazingly bad acting.






Hear these differences when you say the phrase the old and the new . (pron. Thee old and the new.)

I definitely think my cousin's horse is my top-favourite animal. She has a beautiful nature.


When I go to university I'd like to study Medicine if possible.

The tower is a fine property to wander around for an afternoon.


Butterflies hold their wings together when they rest on a flower. (Moths leave their wings open.)
