This story works well as simultaneous reading for groups of three as 'out loud' classroom reading.

The Two Travellers is also suitable as a stage performance.

## Optional props and wardrobe:

• Storyteller:	Smart clothes as for a reporter.
• Travellers 1 and 2:	Hiking gear, sunhat/wide-brimmed
	hat, walking boots.

Ways to read this story

- Don't rush! This helps you to say each word clearly.
- Think of yourselves as actors by adding lots of facial and vocal expression. Small gaps of silence also create dramatic energy. These techniques will bring the story to life.
- If you meet a new word, give it a go and then move on.
- Don't be scared of unusual words. They will become your new best friends.
  (New words strengthen your general knowledge and enable you to become vocabulary-rich in your day-to-day life.)
